

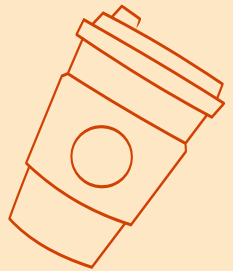


# *The Pumpkin Spice Café*

6. *The Pumpkin Spice Café* brings romance, community interactions, and small-town life together. What were the standout moments for you in the book?

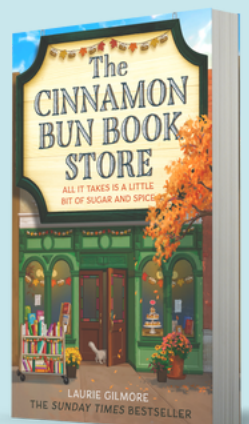




# *The Cinnamon Bun Bookstore*

6. How does the author's use of foreshadowing enhance the anticipation and suspense in the narrative?

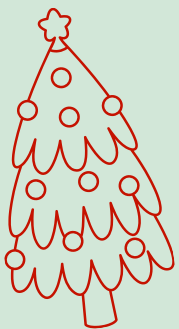
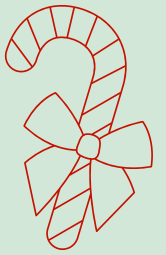




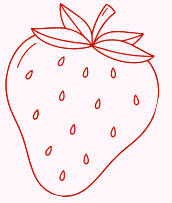
# *The Christmas Tree Farm*

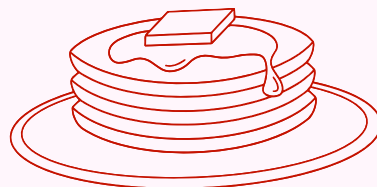
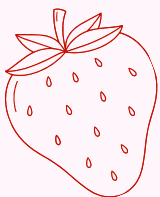
# The Strawberry Patch Pancake House

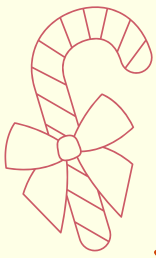


## READING GROUP QUESTIONS
